Happy Easter Season

Note on the gospel

A little doubt can do you good. If you ever are in a "Thomas state of mind"—doubting your faith, doubting God's love, doubting our hope for redemption—consider all the great Christians who have gone before you who have experienced similar doubts: Mother Teresa, Saint Thérèse of Lisieux, Saint Teresa of Avila, Saint John of the Cross, Saint Thomas Aquinas, to name but a few. Doubt isn't the opposite of faith. In one of its forms, doubt is a recurring stage of faith. As we grow, change, and experience setbacks, our certainty may be shaken. Doubt sets in and forces us to review, update, and strengthen our core beliefs. Don't be afraid to confront your doubts to-day.

Divine Mercy Sunday

The second Sunday after Easter is called Divine Mercy Sunday. It is a relatively new addition to the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar. Celebrating the Divine Mercy of Jesus Christ, as revealed by Christ Himself to St. Maria Faustina Kowalska, this feast was extended to the entire Catholic Church by Pope John Paul II on April 30, 2000, the day that he canonized Saint Faustina. This year as we celebrate the feast, my hope and prayer is that the message of God's love and mercy may spread even farther throughout the world.

How to pray the Chaplet of Divine Mercy

Use an ordinary rosary.

- 1. Make the Sign of the Cross
- 2. Pray an Our Father, Hail Mary and The Apostles' Creed
- 3. On the Our Father beads say:

Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

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4. On the Hail Mary beads say:

For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

- Repeat for the five decades.
- 6. Conclude by repeating this prayer 3 times:

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

Following the National Eucharistic Revival commissioning at the parish level, as One Body in Christ, and led by the Holy Spirt to center on The Eucharist, the Vicariate V, Deanery Parishes: Our Lady of the Woods, St. Damian, St. Elizabeth Seton, St. Francis of Assisi, St. George, St. Julie Billiart, St. Michael and St. Stephen Deacon and Martyr Parishes, collaborated to bring our faith communities together to worship and adore the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity, of Christ that will culminate with a Eucharistic Celebration

On **Sunday, April 14, 2024**, as the loaves and the fish multiplied, do the same in your vehicle with family, friends, and neighbors, of **all generations** as we embark on our inaugural **Eucharistic Revival Car Caravan Pilgrimage**. Our pilgrimage will take us to our local holy sites and parishes. In addition, we will enjoy an afternoon of spiritual enrich-

ment focusing on the True Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.

Pilgrimage Route with Approximate Timings (Feel free to join us or drop off at any point in the Car Caravan Pilgrimage):

St. Michael Parish Church Doors (14327 Highland Ave., Orland Park, IL. 60462), will open at 3:15 PM, for 4:00 PM. Start Time of Eucharistic Worship and Adoration.

Depart in a car caravan procession from St. Michael **at 4:30 PM** to St. Francis of Assisi (15050 Wolf Rd., Orland Park, IL. 60467), **Arrive** at St. Francis of Assisi at **4:45 PM**,

Depart in a car caravan procession from St. Francis of Assisi **at 5:25 PM** to Our Lady of the Woods (10731 West 131st. Street, Orland Park, IL. 60462), Arrive at Our Lady of the Woods at **5:40 PM** for **6:00 PM**, **Mass**.

*Upon arrival at each parish, we will exit our vehicles and go into the Church to adore the Real Presence of Christ.

Clergy: priests, and deacons, from the grouping parishes and the Knights of Columbus Honor Guard will participate in the Mass.

A fellowship gathering with light refreshments will take place following the Our Lady of the Woods Mass. Water and Soda will be provided.

A New Paschal Candle Designed by SFA Artists

A new Easter Season means a new Paschal Candle. Normally, like most churches, St. Francis would order a professionally made one from a company. This year, however, I was feeling a little more ambitious and decided to gather a couple of artists from our parish to design our own! Since last December Sue Flanagan, Elissa Perez, and I started planning and testing how we would go about such a project in which we had no previous experience in. We would research and discuss what would be reasonably possible for us to do and if we were confident enough, we would order a blank Paschal Candle to get it done. Thankfully, we kept in storage Paschal Candles from past years which allowed us to experiment with them so that we would know how to execute our ideas on the actual candle. There was certainly a lot of trial and error but eventually we figured out a design and were able to contribute to it each in our own unique ways. See the picture album to see the different steps in our progression.

The Design

Every Paschal Candle is meant to follow the same basic design because of its prominent place in the church and important role in our liturgies. It should have a cross to represent Christ and his sacrifice for us; 5 nails each with grains of incense to remind



us of Jesus' 5 wounds as well as his death (it is Jewish tradition to bury the dead with aromatics); the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, Alpha and Omega, signifying that Christ is God who is the beginning and the end, the author of time itself; and lastly the year in which it is blessed. Everything else on the cross is meant to point to Christ because the entire candle is a symbol of Christ himself.

Keeping in mind these essential elements we decided to design a Paschal Candle that would be particular to St. Francis. At the top of the design are our round stained-glass windows from the church. On the front is the one behind the altar and above the sanctuary. On the back is the one above the baptismal font. In front just below the stained-glass just like in the sanctuary is the main cross. At the bottom of the design is a band with the top and bottom of it being the stained-glass design that you will find in the bell-tower chapel behind the tabernacle. At the center of the band design is a blue band with the Bible in the back and the Host and Chalice in front. These represent the two main liturgies of the Mass, the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. On the sides are olive branches, which symbolize many things such as peace, reconciliation, anointing, and most importantly Christ. The blue underneath represents water, which, again holds many biblical meanings, but I think the most important in this context is Baptism.

Application of Design

I recreated the stained-glass designs from our church on the computer. Sue Flanagan figured out how to transfer the images via printouts and acrylic mold paste (after my failed attempts at transferring it via a different method). Using molding clay Sue also formed and painted the blue band, the olive branches, and the Eucharist/Bible (using cookie molds). They were formed separately and glued after being painted. Elissa Perez created the cross via layers of wax cut and glued together. I ordered gold vinyl stickers of the Greek alphabet and numbers (which were very hard to find!) and applied the Alpha and Omega and 2024 year around the cross. Lastly, the five marks came with blank candle and were stuck onto the candle when first blessed.

The Paschal Candle and the Easter vigil


As I mentioned earlier, the entire candle is a meant to be a symbol of Christ but specifically, Christ as the light of the world that dispels the darkness of sin. The Paschal Candle holds a prominent place during Easter because Easter marks the resurrection moment in which Christ's light broke free into the world to give us salvation. The Easter Vigil emphasizes this in a special way with the service of lights. On this night all the lights are turned off and outside of the church a new Paschal Candle is lit with a newly blessed fire. The candle is then processed into the church as the Priest proclaims, "May the light of Christ, rising in glory, dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds" and the light of the candle then is spread to everyone else in the congregation. I think this is such a special experience (especially for those receiving the Sacraments of Initiation that evening, we had 4 people this year!) but I think many people unfortunately miss out on it. For that reason, I recorded the blessing of our new Paschal Candle and created a short sped-up video of the light of the candle dispersing into church that you can find in the album I provided. Enjoy! Also, feel free to take a closer look at our Paschal Candle!



What to Do with Old Palm Branches?

To properly dispose of the palms, you should either burn them or bury them, but never discard them with the trash. You can cut them into small pieces and bury them in a flower bed or flower pot.


